The National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) has announced the results of its 2005 survey which included Armstrong Atlantic and 20 other Georgia colleges and universities.

In the categories of "Level of Academic Challenge" and "Supportive Campus Environment," sampled students reported scores that are significantly higher than the average benchmark scores for the other 20 Georgia institutions, and also for students at other master's level institutions similar to Armstrong Atlantic. In news from the mathematics department, **Mark Budden** and **Sungkon Chang**, visiting assistant professor, presented talks at the University of American Mathematical Society annual meeting in San Antonio. Chang gave a talk at the University of South Carolina-Columbia. **Sean Eastman** and Chang were both awarded 2005-2006 Research and Scholarship Faculty grants. Budden and **Paul Hadavas** have been awarded Student-Faculty Summer 2006 Collaborative Research Program grants.

Azita Bahrami, information technology, published and presented a paper, "A Framework for Development and Management of E-Lessons in E-Learning," at a conference on web information systems in May 2005 where he also acted as a session chair.

Bill Baird, chemistry and physics, won a Teaching and Learning grant that will permit he and his colleagues to employ a high-speed camera to demonstrate everyday physics problems. The technique will allow students to move away from "cookbook" experiments, and to approach physics investigations with more creative and critical thinking.

Hammers** presented "Brazil's Politics of AIDS: Addressing the Pandemic in the Sleeping Giant of South America," at the Georgia Sociological Association annual conference at St. Simons Island.
